Jose Rizal and Pepe

Jose Rizal inspired the founding of the Katipunan and the Philippine Revolution of 1896 with his two novels: Noli Me Tangere and El Filibusterismo. These novels inspired Filipinos to fight for freedom from their Spanish colonizers. The monologue Pepe was written to commemorate Jose Rizal's 150th birth anniversary. Every city in the Philippines has a monument of Jose Rizal. The Cultural Centre's Tanghalang Pilipino performed Pepe in Manila and in 33 other cities in the country.



The Playwright - Malou Jacob

MaLou Jacob is a dramatist and a cultural provocateur. She is a SEAWRITE, Cultural Centre of the Philippines *Gawad Sining*, and *Gawad Balagtas* awardee. Her monologue *Pepe*, directed by Nonon Padilla was performed by *Tanghalang Pilipino* (TP) in 33 cities. *Pepe* was followed by *Anatomiya ng Korupsyon*, directed by Dennis Marasigan of TP. She also wrote *Macli-ing*, directed by Soxy Topacio of Philippine Educational Theatre Association at the Rajah Sulayman Theater, Fort Santiago and *Batang Mujahideen*, about the interaction of Christians and Muslims in Mindanao. *Pepe* has been translated into various regional languages and produced by various theatre groups through CCP Outreach.

Director's notes by Francis Matheu

For someone who may have read my artistic statement, I may sound like a broken record. But to contextualize the present, one must know the past so here is my story in brief.

My journey with this production dates back to 2017 when the Marawi War broke out. The eruption of war in one of the Philippines' Islamic cities was an important wake-up call for me as a Filipino and theatre artist. In the days following the siege of the city, the initiative to take action to spread awareness and understanding of the great divide between Christian and Muslim Filipinos became a calling that was too difficult to resist. For a creative artist, storytelling and performance-making are the foremost methods that come to mind in creating awareness campaigns for such topics as these.

In search of material, I came across an article about Filipino playwright Malou Jacob and her then-newly-written play, *Batang Mujahideen*. Through that, I connected with Malou and pursued a possible future collaboration with whom she generously agreed. A year later, as I was developing a brand for a project that would reach out to the 2nd and 3rd generations of Filipino migrants, Twin Bill Theatre, a company I co-founded with my twin brother, gave birth to the *Pamana Collection* - a concept that would champion Filipino culture and history through theatre in the service of the Filipinos wherever they thrive in the world.

Meanwhile, coming to Canada as a Master of Fine Arts directing student, Theatre Inconnu's founding artistic director, Clayton Jevne, met and offered me the opportunity to direct a play for their 2023 season. When I asked what play they would want me to direct, I was given a free hand. Immediately *Pamana Collection* came to mind. I reconnected with Malou to ask her permission to stage *Pepe* - a story about one of our National Heroes who fought against Spanish colonization in the Philippines.

And so... here we are.

I would like to acknowledge that as a guest to this beautiful, free and diverse country, I am honoured to have been given the opportunity to share my culture and history as I embrace a new life here as a theatre artist.

Some Background History of Rizal and the Filipino Independence Movement

From **The Philippines - Independence from Spain and the USA**By Meyen Quigley

Before the arrival of Ferdinand Magellan in 1521, and soon thereafter the colonization and Christianization of the Philippines by Spain, the Philippine islands were populated by diverse ethnic groups. Negritos, the ancestors of several indigenous tribes still living in the Philippines today, came to the islands via land bridges and settled there between 45,000 and 30,000 BC. Thereafter, seafaring peoples came in waves from Borneo, Malaya, Indonesia and the Polynesian islands, and by the 5th century BC the culture and civilization of the islands were a mixture of the cultures with influences from India, China, and the Middle East. In 1380, Karimul Makhdum arrived and converted many people to Islam. In the 15th century, trade started with Chinese Ming dynasty merchants.

THE SPANISH COLONIAL PERIOD

On March 16, 1512, Ferdinand Magellan discovered the Archipelago San Lazaro (present-day Samar Island). On April 6, Magellan made a blood compact with Cebu Rajah Humabon, who converted to Catholicism and declared the Muslim community on Mactan Island, headed by Kaliph Pulaka (Lapu-Lapu to Filipinos), as "enemies of the church" On April 27, in the Battle of Mactan, Lapu-Lapu and his men killed Magellan. In 1553, Bernardo de la Torre, a sailor under the command of Spanish admiral Ruy Villalobos, named the islands "Las Islas Felipinas" after Felipe, later King Philip II of Spain. The Philippines became part of Spanish Empire.

1563: Spanish General Miguel Legaspi established first Spanish settlement at Cebu. The Viceroy of Mexico administered the galleon trade between Mexico and the Philippines. The last galleon arrived in Manila in 1815. In 1821 the Philippines was placed under Madrid's administrative control after the overthrow of Spanish rule in Mexico.

THE INDEPENDENCE MOVEMENT

Three centuries of forced labor, the suppression of local religions and beliefs, the unjustified collection of taxes, limits to education, social inequalities, abuses by the Catholic clergy, and other oppressive conditions made Filipinos yearn for independence from Spain.

1872: Spain accused three Filipino priests - Fathers Gomes, Burgos and Zamora - of fomenting a mutiny and executed them.

1880: Jose Rizal, Marcelo del Pilar and Graciano Lopez Jaena went to Europe as students and formed the Propaganda Movement - holding meetings and publishing poetry, articles and pamphlets critical of Spanish rule.

1886: Jose Rizal published the anti-Spanish novel, Noli Me Tangere (Touch Me Not) that ignited Philippine nationalism and strengthened the desire for independence from Spain. He published a second novel, El Filibusterismo, in 1891.

1888: Graciano Lopez Jaena founded the newspaper *La Solidaridad* in Barcelona. The paper urged reforms in both religion and government in the Philippines, and served as the voice of the Propaganda Movement.

1892: Jose Rizal returned to the Philippines and formed the secret society *Liga Filipina*, that aimed to continue the work of the Propaganda Movement. Rizal was arrested by the Spaniards and exiled to Dapitan, where he practiced medicine. That same year revolutionaries in the Philippines under the leadership of Andres Bonifacio established *Katipunan* - a group whose main goal was to gain independence from Spain.

1896: By early 1896 the *Katipunan* had grown to more than 40,000 members. In August, in what is now known as the Battle of Balintawak, Katipuneros tore their *cedulas* (personal identity documents) and leaders declared a revolution against Spain. Bonifacio reorganized the *Katipunan* into a revolutionary government. Jose Rizal was arrested on suspicion of being involved in the revolt and put in prison; he was executed in December 1896.

1897: Leadership of the revolutionary movement shifted to a rival faction of the *Katipunan* headed by Emilio Aguinaldo. Andres Bonifacio was executed in May 1896 on the orders of Aguinaldo. The Pact of *Biak-na-Bato*, signed on December 14, 1897, established a truce between the Spanish colonial government and the Filipino revolutionaries.

1898: On May 1, United States Admiral Dewey defeated the Spanish in the Battle of Manila Bay. This effectively put the U.S. in control of the Spanish colonial government.

On May 19, 1898, the U.S. Navy transported Emilio Aguinaldo, who had been in exile in Hong Kong, back to the Philippines. On June 5, 1898, Aguinaldo issued a decree proclaiming June 12, 1898 as the day of independence. The Philippine flag was officially unfurled for the first time that day.

AFTER JUNE 12, 1898

The Philippines failed to win international recognition of its independence - not from either the United States of Spain. The Spanish government later ceded the Philippine archipelago to the United States in the 1898 Treaty of Paris. The Philippine Revolutionary Government did not recognize the treaty and the two sides subsequently fought what was known as the Philippine-American War. The Philippines gained independence from the United States of America on July 4, 1946.

On May 12, **1962**, President Diosdado Macapagal issued *Presidential Proclamation No. 28*, which declared June 12 a special public holiday throughout the Philippines, "... in commemoration of our people's declaration of their inherent and inalienable right to freedom and independence."
